Assessment

Timestables

Students are currently undertaking a timestables challenge at school. For each set of timestables they can learn and take to fluency (automatic recall), they will achieve ten Dojo points on their tally. There is a real buzz of excitement in the air! As each individual's score adds to the class overall tally, students are working extra hard to support their peers. Parents can help at home by practising these tables with their children. Please remember, this is all in fun and just supports students in being able to draw on calculations more readily, taking some of the pressure out of mathematical problem solving.
